Kingdom Partners (KP) was established because we concluded that opening more churches is not the answer to transform the city. The answer is to strengthen individual churches and create a unifying platform for churches to work together.

Kingdom Partners seeks to be a catalyst to help transform lives and communities in Chattanooga by announcing, demonstrating God's love for all people, focusing on three core areas:

- One Kingdom, One City, (Connecting communities of resource with communities of need while reconciling people to Jesus Christ and to each other)
- **Pastor and Lay Leadership Development**
- **Ourban Church Revitalization**

The church is the only authentic cross-racial, cross-cultural, and cross-generational basis for oneness in existence. Most Christians live in their comfort zone when it comes to racial disparity issues in the United States. This is the first rung of the Journey to Brotherhood/Sisterhood. As an individual and/or group moves from the comfort zone to the discomfort zone and then the education zone to the growth zone, they are on the journey towards brotherhood/sisterhood beyond racial differences. This guide will explain each section in detail.

Comfort Zone

This is where we currently live. It is comfortable and does not challenge our current beliefs or practices.

Typical Statements

- I am not a racist, don't tell racist jokes, nor find racist "jokes" funny.
- All people regardless of color are sons and daughters of the Most High.
- Pray my children and grandchildren will see the day when color does not matter.
- ♦ I judge people according to their character and actions, not how they look.
- ♦ All people must learn the culture of our nation.

Typical Activities

- ♦ Active in Church with friends; Small Group engagement.
- ♦ Make charitable gifts to multiple causes.
- Pray and repent when you make mistakes.
- Our Church supports local and international missions.
- My church does community outreach.

Faith Journey

My Lord and Savior is Jesus Christ - believe in the Trinity.

Attend church regularly - Church is a place I go for corporate worship; my faith should be visible 24 hours/day or it is done in vain.

My actions speak so loudly, I do not need to say anything.

We are all created in the image of God - daughters and sons of the Most High, no one better than any other due to race, culture, age, or religion.

Discomfort Zone

This is where we begin to question long held beliefs. We must be willing to be embarrassed or corrected.

Typical statements

- ◊ I do not want to feel guilty
- ◊ Why are some people so angry? Lots of different schisms.
- **O** What do the protests expect to accomplish; what is behind the violence and destruction?
- ♦ Does my silence support racism?
- ◊ I avoid asking questions because I may get embarrassed.
- 6 'Do the best you can until you know better. Then when you know better, do better" Maya Angelou

Typical Activities

- ♦ All races should begin to understand their privilege.
- Read history to understand about racism/reconciliation against all people groups. First start with gospel centric engagement building authentic relationships
- ♦ Risk embarrassing yourself be vulnerable.
- ♦ Expand your circle of friends
- ♦ Listen to stories of racism not just a black and white issue.

Faith Journey

Some preach love but do not demonstrate love and compassion.

Small Group Study with people who don't look like you.

Visiting each other churches or ministries events

Attending Fellowship Luncheons at churches and non-profits with those who don't look like you and listen, engage, and practice.

Education Zone

This is where we expose ourselves to new ideas, new understandings, and conversations with people with different life experiences than ours.

Typical Statements

- ♦ Racism is a system and a major problem.
- I will educate myself about racism and do research on claims of systemic racism and revisionist history.
- I will listen and learn from those who think and look different from me.
- ♦ I never stop learning; my job is to learn something new every day.
- I will listen and learn from those who think and look different from me.

Typical Activities

- ◊ Strive to understand the impact of poverty in all communities.
- Strive to end your personal isolation get out of your comfort zone. Engage with people who you might not agree with.
- Support charities that work to end poverty, racism, and injustice.
- ◊ Start thinking in terms of we rather than me
- ♦ Learn what micro-aggression is and how it is used to support the cancel culture.

Faith Journey

Study God's Word and other sacred texts.

Pray.

Re-read your baptismal covenants*

Support pastors and leaders and members paired up to build long-term authentic relationships.

Support churches doing enrichment together to learn about each other's cultures.

Growth Zone

This is where we get new understandings, commitments to change our behavior and an expanded view of the life experiences of other. It should also result in living into our baptismal covenants.

Typical Statements

- Lives depend on this conversation about America living up to its values and potential.
- ♦ My learning will never be finished.
- ♦ I will not vote for racists will go beyond the headlines.
- ◊ I know that I have unknowingly benefitted from racism.
- ♦ I will speak out when I see racism in action.
- I do not let mistakes or embarrassment deter me from getting better.

Typical Activities

- ♦ Challenge racist comments.
- ♦ Do not be silent.
- ♦ Support minority and women-owned businesses.
- ◊ Vote for people whose values are to unite rather than divide us!
- ♦ Love your neighbor.

Faith Journey

Forgive easily and often.

Pray for reconciliation.

Commit to live an overtly Christion life every day in every aspect of your life - walk the talk.

Love your neighbor.

Do something for others - pay it forward!
